

What to Expect When Stopped

Each situation is unique and the police officer must alter his or her response to fit the circumstance.

A Goodyear Police Officer:

- Will provide his or her name and serial number upon request;
- Who is not in uniform will present proper identification; you may request to examine their credentials so that you are satisfied they are a law enforcement officer;
- Will tell you why you are being stopped;
- Will only use the force necessary to effect the arrest of a suspect and maintain the custody of the prisoner;
- Will not search the body of a person of the opposite sex except to prevent injury to the officer or another person, or to prevent the disposal or destruction of evidence; and
- Will only arrest a person for a crime committed in the officers presence, or when the officer has probable cause to believe the person has already committed a crime.

Arizona traffic law requires that all drivers shall yield the right of way to emergency vehicles. Drivers are to immediately pull over to the right side of the road, stop and remain in a stopped position until the emergency vehicle has passed.

We hope the information in this brochure will be helpful in answering common questions about traffic stop procedures and in reducing the stress when stopped by the Police.

Commending Superior Performance

If you wish to commend the actions of any Goodyear Police department employee, you can:

- ✓ Ask to speak to the employee's supervisor and verbally communicate your praise, or
- ✓ You can write a letter to the Chief of Police explaining your praise.

Commendations received by the Chief of Police for any Goodyear Police Department employee will result in advising the employee of your gratitude, and in permanently recording his or her actions and your appreciation in the employee's personnel file.

Citizen Complaint Procedure


Our Policy

It is the policy of the Goodyear Police Department to investigate all complaints against the department or its employees. This ensures the integrity of the department while protecting the rights and interests of both citizens and department employees.

A supervisor will interview you about your complaint. You may be interviewed at the Goodyear Police Department. This interview may be audio or video taped.

After a thorough investigation of the complaint, a supervisor will notify you in writing of the disposition of your complaint and whether disciplinary action will be taken.

Why Do Police Stop People?

There are many different reasons why you might be stopped by the police.

Whatever the reason, the officer needs your cooperation.

- You may have committed a traffic violation.
- You may fit the description of a suspect.
- The officer might think you are in trouble and need help.
- You may have witnessed a crime.

If you are stopped by the police while driving, you may feel confused, anxious, or even angry. These are natural feelings, but remember traffic stops can also be stressful and dangerous for the police officer.

Each year a number of law enforcement officers are killed or seriously injured while making the “routine traffic stop”. Police officers are especially vulnerable during the hours of darkness.

With this in mind, there are things that you, as a law-abiding citizen, can do to help lessen the unpleasantness of the experience.



When stopped by police, remember:

1. A police officer may pull you over at any time for a traffic offense or police investigation.
2. When you see the red and blue lights and/or hear the siren, remain calm and safely pull over to the right side of the road as soon as possible.
3. Remain in your vehicle unless the officer advises you otherwise.
4. Keep your hands on the steering wheel where the officer can see them.
5. Avoid any sudden movements, especially toward the floorboard, rear seat, or passenger side of the vehicle.
6. Do not immediately reach for your license or other documents until the officer requests them. Arizona State Law requires drivers to show their license, vehicle registration and insurance card upon request.
7. If your other documents are out of reach, tell the officer where they are before you reach for them.
8. If you have a weapon in the vehicle, promptly notify the officer of its location.
9. If the stop occurs during darkness, turn on your dome or interior lights so the officer can easily see the interior of your car.
10. If there are passengers in your vehicle, encourage them to remain quiet and cooperate with instructions.
11. The officer may issue you a ticket. If you feel the reason is vague or unclear, ask the officer for details.
12. Avoid becoming argumentative. Arguing will not change the officer's mind. If you want to contest the violation, you will have an opportunity to address the matter in court.
13. Be honest with the officer. If you really didn't see the stop sign, or were unaware of the speed limit, let the officer know. Being honest about a situation never hurts.
14. Finally, if you receive a ticket, accept it calmly. Accepting it is not an admission of guilt. Your signature is not always required.
